Getting to Know the Collie

The Collie is one of the most beautiful dog breeds. Though many people may have a mental picture of the Collie as looking like Lassie, the Collie is actually bred in two different coat types and four different color variations that add to the breed's great beauty and appeal.

COAT: There are two coat types or varieties of Collie: rough and smooth. Both varieties are the same except for the length of coat. The smooth has a short, hard, dense, flat coat, while the rough Collie has a long well-fitting harsh-textured coat.

COLOR: The four recognized colors are "Sable and White," "Tri-color," "Blue Merle," and "White." There is no preference among them.

Most important, the Collie is an ideal family dog, responsive to its owners and a loving and devoted companion for all ages.



Health

The Collie is a healthy, sturdy breed with an average life span of about 12 years. Like other white-footed herding breeds, Collies can be sensitive to certain drugs, including Ivermectin (found in some heartworm preventatives) and Imodium. For details on drug sensitivity and MDR1 testing, visit Washington State University's College of Veterinary Medicine or the Collie Health Foundation.

Prospective owners should also be aware of two eye conditions that may affect the breed: Canine Eye Anomaly (CEA) and Progressive Retinal Atrophy (PRA). These are unrelated conditions but important to screen for.

The Collie Club of America's Code of Conduct requires eye exams by a Board-certified Veterinary Ophthalmologist before puppies are placed in new homes. Each dog receives a certificate describing its individual vision results, helping ensure the continued health of this remarkable breed.



The Collie in Your Home

Gentle and engaging, the Collie will steal your heart and fill your home with delight. Loyal as a companion, friend for children, or worker on the farm, the Collie brings unconditional, generous, and forever love—alongside lifelong responsibility for its care and well-being.

Females stand at least 22 inches and weigh 50–60 pounds; males are at least 24 inches and weigh 60–75 pounds.

Though often misunderstood, Collies don't need daily brushing or frequent bathing. Coat care depends on the amount of coat and time of year. Rough Collies in full coat should be brushed weekly; summer or out-of-coat dogs need less. Smooth Collies require less brushing and bathing, but both shed. Generally clean and odor-free, Collies need routine brushing, nail trimming, bathing, teeth and ear cleaning, and annual wellness checkups. Grooming shops can help with coat maintenance.
